Principal Message

I hope that all of our families had an enjoyable holiday season. We know that families are busy with the everyday hustle, and so I hope that you were able to spend some quality time together with your kids!

January goes by quickly as our grade 9-12 Semester 1 classes come to an end in just a couple of weeks. I have included the Exam Schedule with last day of classes below for easy access.

While exams can seem stressful for students, the best way to reduce that stress is to appropriately prepare and that is an important skill that we can all help students learn and develop. Encourage your child to allocate some time each evening over the next few weeks to review content in their courses. They can use Teacher Advisor to work with classroom teachers to get extra help or clarify any questions they may have. I have included some helpful study hints for teens below in this newsletter.

With typical Alberta winter weather upon us, we know that it brings many questions regarding scheduling/cancellation/buses etc. Diploma Exams are standardized government exams administered to all students in Alberta taking that course and are written on the same date, at the same time, with the same experience (eg. rooms set up the same, access to the same resources, same directions provided). For students writing diploma exams, it is important to note that exemptions for diploma exams are not granted by the school, but rather, go through Alberta Education for approval. This process can take days before a decision is made. As a school, we do not have control over the decisions made. If students are registered on Clearview Buses and buses do not run, we will apply for an exemption for the diploma exam for those bus students, but the final decision is made by Alberta Education. Safety and security of students is a priority, and as always, it is a parent's decision whether or not to send your child, but please note that the risk is that if an exemption is not granted by Alberta Education, your child would have to wait to write

their diploma exam in April, which is the next standardized diploma exam time. If you have questions, reach out to administration and we can help answer them for you.

We also know that weather impacts extracurricular. At this time of year, everything that we plan is tentative and subject to the weather. As a general rule of thumb, if buses do not run, all extracurricular activities are cancelled. We know that this is a frustration as there is a lot of work and time put into organizing family schedules and logistics, but safety of students has to remain the priority.

We are excited to be organizing our second annual Grade 7/8 Wellness Day on January 28th. We are in need of parent volunteers to help make this day run smoothly - we are also looking for any parent who might have a session they would be able to offer! 2025 Annual Education Results Report

What is this?

The Annual Education Results Report highlights our data from the Accountability Pillar Survey. The Accountability Pillar Survey is an accountability measure for all schools across the province of Alberta and helps the provincial government to monitor school success.

Who completes the survey?

Each year the provincial government sends surveys home to our grade 7 and 10 parents and in school, we are asked to have grade 7 and 10 students and all staff complete the survey. These results are then released to schools so that they can use the data to inform decisions and practice each year. Parents of grade 7 and 10 students should expect a package in the mail starting at the end of January and beginning of February.

Alberta Education Assurance Survey

Information for parents and guardians

About the survey

Every year, Alberta Education surveys students, their parents and all teachers on behalf of schools and school authorities to assess what is working well and where there is room for improvement. The survey asks students in grades 4, 7 and 10, and their parents, about their thoughts, feelings and experiences in school. The survey will be administered between January and March 2024. In some schools, all students in grades 4 and above and their parents will be surveyed.

Participants will be asked questions on a variety of topics, such as welcoming, caring, respectful and safe learning environments; student learning engagement; and parental involvement. The survey does not ask for names and cannot be used to identify individual participants.



Why is the survey needed?

Alberta's Assurance Framework requires school authorities across the province to report their performance according to a number of different measures that provide key information about how the education system is doing. A provincial survey allows all school authorities to be measured on the same things at the same time.

Participation in the survey is voluntary:

- · All participants may opt out of taking the survey at any time with no repercussions and/or skip any questions they do not wish to answer.
- All responses are anonymous. The survey does not collect personally identifiable information and Random Access Codes will be used to group responses by survey type, school and authority.
- · Only grouped data where there are more than six
- All data collected will be managed in accordance with the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act.
- If you have any questions regarding the survey or your child's participation, please contact your child's school directly.





How will I take the survey?

- Parents or guardians are issued a single-use Random Access Code mailed through Canada Post to complete the survey online.
- . The code must be used to access the survey and helps Alberta Education group your response as being from a parent/guardian. It is not used to identify individuals.
- Monitor your Canada Post mailbox starting late-January 2024 for the survey invitation package from Alberta Education.
- Parents or guardians with more than one student in an eligible grade will receive a separate survey invitation package for each child.
- Paper copies of the survey can also be requested through your school principal once the survey opens.



How will students take the survey?


- · Students complete the survey at school.
- · Before the survey begins, your child's teacher or school berore the survey organs, your runn is teacher or school staff will explain to the students that the survey is not a test – there are no right or wrong answers. They will also explain that there are no repercussions for opting out of participating and that they may skip questions they do not wish to answer.
- Responses are submitted anonymously. Random Access Codes will be used to group responses by survey type, grade, school and school authority only.

New faces are always welcome!

1. Pick a place and time

Everyone has their own idea about the best place and time to study. Whether it's your bedroom at night or the library after school, find a study space and a regular study time that works for you and stick with it.

- **Set up your study space** Your study space should be quiet, comfortable and distraction-free. It should make you feel happy and inspired. Decorate it with your favourite pictures or objects. If you want to listen to music or burn incense, pick a space that lets you do that.
- **Find your best time** Some people work better in the morning. Others work better at night. Work out which time suits you and plan to study then. Don't study much later than your usual bedtime pushing yourself late at night can make you too tired to study properly.

2. Study every day

If you study a little bit every day you'll be continually reviewing things in your mind. This helps you understand things. It also helps you avoid the stress of last-minute cramming.

Early in the year an hour or two a night might be enough to stay on top of things. Later in the year you might need to study more each day.

If you're finding it hard to find time to study, cut back on some (but not all!) of your other activities. Prioritizing study might mean spending less time online, or it might mean cutting back on shifts at work, or giving weekend sport a miss for a while.

3. Plan your time

It helps to have some plans in motion so you can make the most of your study time.

- **Set alarms** Set alarms to remind you about your study plans. A regular reminder keeps you honest and your plans on track.
- Use a wall planner Stick a calendar or wall planner up so you can see it whenever you're studying. Mark it up with important dates, like exams and assignment due dates. Use it to block out your regular study timetable too.
- Make to-do lists Lists break tasks down into manageable chunks. At the start of the week,
 make a list of the things that you need to have done by the end of the week. Make a to-do list
 at the start of each study session too, so that you're clear about what you need to be doing
 with your time.
- Set time limits Before you start your study session, have a look at your to-do list and give
 yourself a set time to spend on each task. If you don't get something done in the set time,
 consider whether it's the best use of your time to keep going with it, or to start working on
 something else.

4. Discover your learning style

Most of us have a preferred way of learning. Get to know the learning style you're most comfortable with and study in the ways you learn best.

Note that these styles are just a way to think about diffent studying techniques – they're not hard and fast rules that say you should only study in one way. Try each of these out and see which ways you prefer.

- **Auditory learners** prefer to learn by listening. Try reading your notes aloud and discussing them with other people. You might like to record key points and play them back.
- **Visual learners** prefer to learn by seeing. Try using colours in your notes and draw diagrams to help represent key points. You could try to remember some ideas as images.
- Tactile/kinesthetic learners prefer to learn by doing. Try using techniques like role-playing or building models to revise key points.

5. Review and revise

At least once a week you should go back over the things you've studied in class. Thinking things over can help you to understand the concepts and help you remember when you need them the most.

- **Quiz** Get a friend or family member to quiz you on key concepts. Offer to help your friends with their work too. Quizzes are great ways to get confident about what you know and find out what you still need to learn.
- Make your own study materials Think up some practice exam questions or create your own flash cards to help you study. This way you learn it all twice: once when you make the study materials and once when you use them to revise.

6. Take breaks

It's important to take breaks while you're studying, especially if you're feeling tired or frustrated. Working too long on a task can actually decrease your performance.

When you take a break, make sure you get away from your desk or study space. A bit of physical – even just a walk around the block – can sometimes help you to look at a problem in a different way and could even help you to solve it.

7. Ask for help

If you're stuck on something, or something just doesn't seem to make sense, you can always ask for help. Talk to your teachers or lecturers about the things you don't understand. Talk to your friends and fellow students too.

8. Stay motivated

When you're studying it helps to keep in mind your reasons for doing all this hard work, like a course or career you're working towards. It can help to have something in your study space to remind you of your goals.

9. App it up

There are heaps of apps out there for helping students with all aspects of study. Have a chat with your friends and teachers to see which apps they recommend.

10. Look after yourself

You'll study better if you take care of yourself. Make sure you eat well and get enough sleep and physical exercise. Don't reward yourself with too many sugary or fatty snacks or push yourself to study late into the night. It's also a good idea to make sure you drink lots of water when you're studying.
